Elegance and Splendour of Art Deco. The Kyoto Costume Institute, Jewellery Houses Cartier and Van Cleef & Arpels

Outline:

This show exhibited the collection of women's clothing by haute couture European houses of the Art Deco period from the Kyoto Costume Institute. Among them are Chanel, Worth, Poiret, Lucille, Paquin, Callot Sisters, Lanvin, Fortuny, etc. Moreover, jewels of 1910–1930s created by jewelry houses Cartier and Van Cleef & Arpels, together with original designs and photographs from the archives were exhibited. The display shows how an epoch combines different kinds of decorative art. For the first time, clothes and jewels as a single ensemble were introduced by Louis Cartier and Jeanne Lanvin at the pavilion during the exhibition in Paris in 1925.

The Moscow Kremlin Museums refer to the theme of Art Deco as a unique artistic and socio-cultural phenomenon of the 20th century. This style of bright creative imagination, inspired by European classics and modernism, culture of ancient civilizations, national traditions and rapid technological progress, influenced all art forms in 1920–1930s, and remains relevant nowadays.
